>I've discovered that the Bureau of Aging and Disability Resources (BADR)

>and Harmony have set up an Internet site with the domain name:

>DHFSBADR.ORG. The registered owner, administrator and technician are all
>the same person - Karl Schlenker.

>

>Karl Schlenker is also Harmony's sole administrator for SAMS in Wisconsin.

>Harmony has provided Schlenker with a development environment to test

>Harmony's products.

>

>All "state" policy mandates for the Nutrition Program have only been posted
>to Schlenker's DHFSBADR.ORG Internet site. They have not been approved for
>content by the DHFS Secretary's Office as is required for all other public
>facing sites. There are no discernable security procedures in BADR and
>none of the known forms, reports or processes conform to any identifiable
>standard.

>

>Harmony and BADR are one and the same and have perpetrated the cruelest of
>hoaxes upon Wisconsin's most vulnerable citizens. Every report listing
>participants by all of the 400 plus SAMS data entry operators is a breach
>of privacy for persons listed in that report. If the report is printed, the
>listed participants' privacy may be breached many times, for years to come.
>There are no known confidentiality agreements signed by SAMS data entry
>operators.

>

>There are hundreds of thousands of individuals, their caretakers and
>relative entered in the system resulting in an astronomical number of times
>that privacy has been breached.

>

>Because Harmony and BADR have not followed state law or any recognizable
>security standard, Harmony's total nation-wide system has been vulnerable
>through the Wisconsin gateway since the beginning of SAMS.

>

>I am personally concerned about the security breaches that have occurred
>relative to my e-health record. Schlenker, giving a poorly fabricated
>reason to the director of McFarland's outreach program, revoked my rights
>as a data entry operator to prevent me from accessing the SAMS system.

>I request that the Department of Administration determine who is

>responsible for indemnifying me, the hundreds of thousands of Wisconsin's
>citizens, and the hundreds of millions of others, nation-wide whose privacy
>has been breached, countless times.

Mr. Behr,

It has come to my attention that you continue to raise security concerns about our software to our customer, the State of Wisconsin, and to the media. I am surprised that you continue to have concerns given the repeated assurances you have received directly from our customer that these issues have been reviewed and addressed as appropriate.

Here at Harmony, we take the security of our software very seriously. If you have a concern about a particular security issue that you believe still exists, I would greatly appreciate that you contact me directly. To date, our company has never heard directly from you about any security issue. If you feel that your concerns have not been heard or addressed, I would be pleased to discuss them with you.

I am concerned, however, that you have some misinformation about our systems. I would like to address some specific factual inaccuracies in your latest email to our customer:

* Contrary to your assertion in your email to our client, Agingnetwork.com runs on Windows 2003, and has since its inception. At no time has it run on Windows 2000. It appears that your security concerns are based on an assumption about our operating system that is not correct. Since you stated in your email that had the system been running on Windows 2003 it would have been secure, I hope you now understand that it has been and is secure.

* You seem to be concerned that your concerns were not taken seriously. Let me assure you, that when your security queries were brought to the attention of the State, they quickly brought them to our attention, where they were treated very seriously. We understand that the State directly contacted you to assure you that the issues had been reviewed and addressed.

I would also ask you to be very careful as to what information you publicly disclose. Information that you may have had access to as an employee of the State of Wisconsin may be confidential information of the State or of Harmony and you likely have confidentiality obligations regarding such information. We would also request that any statements that you do make about the Harmony system, be factually accurate. To date, they have not, and Harmony can not continue to allow such statements to go unchallenged.

We all want to make sure that Harmony software is secure. We believe it is, but to the extent you have factually accurate reasons to believe it is not, we are happy to hear from you. We are always assessing our systems to make sure that our security is where it needs to be to protect our client's information.

SUBJECT: Alleged "Serious Security Problem"

Fred Buhr, a volunteer at the McFarland Senior Center, presents a series of assertions in this email which significantly misrepresent the conscientious administration of the Older Americans Act programs in the Bureau of Aging and Disability Resources (BADR) in DHFS. Staff in BADR has been respectful and attentive to Mr. Buhr's concerns for several months.

BADR has contracted with Area Agencies on Aging to secure the services of Karl Schlenker to administer the SAMS Older Americans program information system. Karl is supervised by an experienced manager in BADR. Policy memoranda, user guides, technical assistance and information about updates from the software provider (Harmony) are issued by BADR via email to all SAMS users. Karl is the primary author or distributor of the information

As a convenience to SAMS users, Karl set up an Internet site where he deposited the memos and material in response to frequently asked questions. The site includes training videos related to use of SAMS. All material is previously published and available from other sources. No secure or private personal information is presented on the site. The site was established without following protocol for DHFS web postings. The Bureau has begun transferring the SAMS information to the DHFS website, at which time the stand-alone website will be shut down. Harmony has not participated in the development or maintenance of the website. Further, Karl has not benefited in any way from managing this website, which is merely a repository of work materials for users.

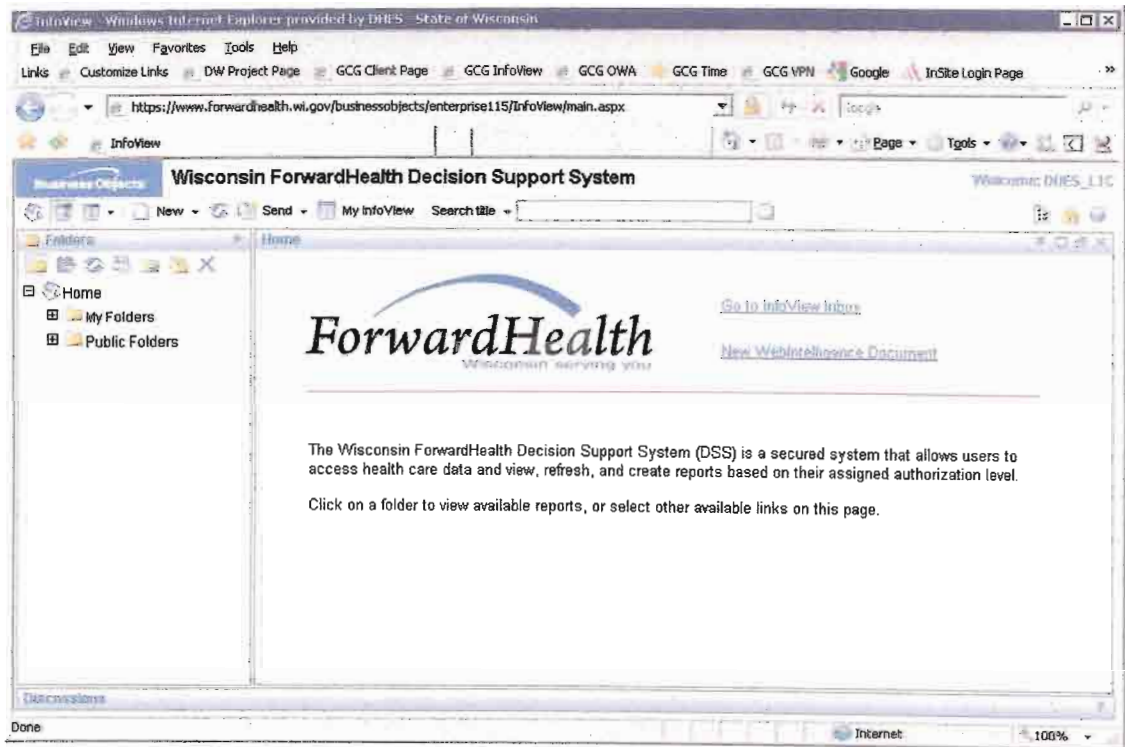
- Mr. Buhr asserts that Karl is Harmony's sole administrator for SAMS in Wisconsin. This is not true. Karl is not a Harmony employee. Karl is Wisconsin's primary (but not sole) administrator for SAMS.
- Mr. Buhr asserts that Harmony provided Karl with a development environment to test Harmony's products. In fact, Karl declined the offer to participate.
- Mr. Buhr asserts that policy for the nutrition program has only been posted on Karl's internet site. This is not true. A manual of policies and procedures has been published by BADR.
- Mr. Buhr asserts that the Secretary has not approved content for the BADR Internet site as is required. The Secretary does not approve all web postings; this responsibility is delegated to the divisions. All material posted as policy was approved by management within the Division of Long Term Care/Bureau of Aging and Disability Resources.
- Mr. Buhr asserts that Harmony and BADR are one and the same. This is not true. The Bureau of Aging and Disability Resources is an agency within the Department of Health and Family Services, designated as the single state agency

on aging by the federal Administration on Aging. The Bureau has a contractual relationship with Harmony.

- Mr. Buhr asserts the every report listing participants by data entry operators is a breach of privacy for all persons listed in the report. This is not true. SAMS users can only see the names of individuals who are participants in their programs. County aging offices and their service providers are covered by the same confidentiality provisions that apply to all public human services programs.
- Mr. Buhr asserts that hundreds of thousands of individuals have had their privacy breached an astronomical number of times. This is not true. Repeated claims to that effect can only serve to falsely alarm senior citizens and should be vigorously denied.
- Mr. Buhr asserts that Harmony and BADR (DHFS) have not followed state laws or security standards and the SAMS system is vulnerable. We are aware of no violations of state law. Further, we expect that the forthcoming Third Party Security audit at Harmony will document the integrity of the system.
- Mr. Buhr asserts that his rights to serve as a data entry operator were revoked for a “poorly fabricated reason.” This is not true. Mr. Buhr informed Secretary Timberlake and Secretary Morgan in a correspondence received April 23, 2008, that he would suspend his data entry tasks as a volunteer because of his concerns about the SAMS system. Because he stated his intention to discontinue entering data, there is no need for him to maintain a password. Good security practice would suggest that when a staff member (or volunteer) resigns from his duties, his password should be revoked. Therefore, the password used by Mr. Buhr was changed as a standard security measure. This action was taken in consultation with McFarland Senior Center and Dane County.
- Mr. Buhr asserts that he and hundreds of thousands of Wisconsin’s citizens, and hundreds of millions nationwide have had their privacy breached countless times. We are not aware of any documented security breaches of SAMS.

The InfoView home screen includes a large *Forward Health – Wisconsin Serving You* logo. It has a panel for the folders that contain reports. To the right of the logo, there is an area with a colored background that has a link to your personal Inbox and a link to create a new WebIntelligence document.



The Universe also contains logic that is automatically used when Web Intelligence creates code for your queries. You do not need to know a programming language. You do not need to look up and type the exact database item names, or be concerned with the way tables link together. Web Intelligence and the universe do that for you.

Datamart Universe

Datamarts are groups of data warehouse tables related to a single line of business or subject area, and are designed from the users' point of view for analysis purposes.

A Datamart Universe is the BusinessObjects presentation of a Datamart. The LTCare Datamart Universes are the ones you will most often select, as they are the friendliest to use.

Each universe presents data from one source system, such as MCO Encounters or Child Functional Screens. The design of a Datamart Universe has these qualities:

1. It allows for maximum flexibility in creating ad-hoc queries. Ask any question you want.
2. It uses the merged data about persons, and presents the same data to each Datamart Universe. Information about a person is consistent. Merged data means that information is gathered and combined from multiple systems.
3. It does the same for providers.
4. It provides definitions for coded data.
5. It automates the creation of queries. You do not need to know how to write code.
6. It provides fields with totals and counts, and objects that perform other frequently used functions. You do not need to type query code by hand.

The Long Term Care **Datamart** Universes are:

LTCare Encounter Datamart Universe
LTCare Adult Functional Screen Datamart Universe
LTCare Adult Personal Care Functional Screen Datamart Universe
LTCare Child Functional Screen Datamart Universe
LTCare Mental Health Functional Screen Datamart Universe

Public Folders

The second folder group is Public Folders. This folder group contains all the sub folders appropriate to your organization or job.

Here are two important things to remember about the Public Folders

- Any changes you make affect everyone

The various public folders contain reports that are shared by all users of the public folder. Be careful when in the Public Folders. If you move a report, it won't be there for others to see. If you delete a report, it is deleted for everyone. If you modify a report, it is modified for everyone.

Warning: Be especially careful about publishing reports to public folders that contain protected health information. All users that have access to the public folder will have access to the protected health information.

- Share with others

If you create a report that others want to use, it may be a candidate for placement in a public folder.

Data Dictionary

The Data Dictionary for a BusinessObjects Universe tells about the data that is in the Universe. The Dictionary gives the name used for the data, gives a definition or description of the data, and indicates all of the Universes that have that data.

2. Purge the data from the report and then save it. This saves the query and report layout specifications, but not the data. When a report has many pages of data, it is thoughtful to purge the data before saving the report.
3. Delete instances of the report. Each time a report is scheduled, it creates a new instance with the report query, page definition and the current data. When you look at a list of reports in a folder, the right hand column lists the number of saved historical instances or snapshots of the report. Deleting instances that are not needed frees up space.

Using Other Universes

In general, it is wisest to use the Universes with the names LTCare . . . Datamart Universe.

In some cases, it may be reasonable and possible to combine LTCare DW data with data from other universes. In order to do this, you will need to know the data very well and have advanced skills in using Web Intelligence or else get technical help.

When you go into Web Intelligence to create a new document, you see a list of Universes from which to choose. The LTCare Data Warehouse universes that are specially designed for business intelligence and ad-hoc reports have names that begin with 'LTCare' and end with 'Datamart Universe':

- LTCare Adult Functional Screen Datamart Universe
- LTCare Adult Personal Care Functional Screen Datamart Universe
- LTCare Child Functional Screen Datamart Universe
- LTCare Encounter Datamart Universe
- LTCare Mental Health Functional Screen Datamart Universe

Other LTCare Data Warehouse Universes are copies of the source systems, and are not designed for flexible queries and business intelligence. They are used to investigate situations where we need to see exactly what is in the source data acquisition systems. They are:

- LTCare FSIA Audit and Archive (Functional Screen Information Access)
- LTC Encounter Audit and Archive
- LTC Encounter ODS (Operational Data Store)

Depending on your work functions and security permission, you may have other Universes to choose from within Web Intelligence. Some examples are Claims Analysis, CMO Encounter ODS, Family Care, HSRS LTS, and LTCFS-ODS.

These are not part of the LTCare Data Warehouse and are not designed for easy merging with data from the LTCare Data Warehouse Datamart Universes, but it is possible using a merged dimension. Re: Privacy Statement

Aging Unit Action Required

Aging units, and their providers, are **required** to include the "privacy statement" that follows on all registration forms, nutrition risk forms, and any other forms used to collect client-specific information that is placed in the SAMS database.

"The information you are being asked to provide is needed to determine if you are eligible to receive Older Americans Act Services and to comply with federal reporting requirements. This information will be stored in a secure electronic database and will not be used for any other purpose. Your information will not be shared with another agency without your permission. This information will not be sold to anyone. You have the right to review your electronic record and request changes to assure accuracy. You will not be denied most services if you refuse to provide this information. If you have questions regarding this, please ask the aging unit staff. "

Copies of prospective forms must be sent to the appropriate area agency on aging for review and approval, by October 1, 2008. The approved forms must be in use no later than November 1, 2008.

Area Agency Action Required

Area agencies on aging are required to assure aging unit compliance with the privacy statement requirement. To this end, area agencies are required to submit a written assurance of compliance by **all** aging units in their PSA to BADR by November 1, 2008. This should be in the form of a single communication, rather than individual assurances of compliance.

FAQ's Regarding Participant Information

1. **Q:** Are participants of Aging programs required to complete a registration form in order to receive services?

A: Participants are asked to complete a registration form with basic information, name, address, dob, etc. This information is used to validate eligibility for aging programs. An individual will not be denied services if they refuse to complete a form. However, they should understand that failure to do so could affect the local agencies funding.

2. **Q:** Are there any exceptions to this requirement?

A: Yes, in order for a person to receive either respite or direct services under the NFCSP, they must complete the registration and functional screen to determine eligibility. This is a federal requirement.

Additionally, persons receiving home delivered meals are required to undergo an initial functional assessment, with annual reassessments, to determine their eligibility for the program.

3. **Q:** Are nutrition programs required to have all participants complete the Nutrition Screening Form ("Determine Your Nutritional Health Checklist")?

A: Yes, the Administration on Aging (AOA) requires nutrition programs target their services to individuals who are at high nutrition risk. The research based Nutrition Screening Form ("Determine Your Nutritional Health Checklist") is the tool that Wisconsin is using to identify persons at high nutritional risk and assist nutrition programs in reporting this required information.

4. **Q:** Are nutrition programs required to track other information from the Nutrition Screening Form in addition to the high nutritional risk information?

A: Yes, in addition, effective 3/1/08 all nutrition programs are required to use SAMS to track client nutrition data from the "Determine Your Nutritional Health Checklist" Nutrition Screening Form. Please refer to the SAMS Data Entry and Reporting document that Karl Schlenker developed to help nutrition programs understand how to enter the required SAMS data.

5. **Q:** Will a participant be denied a meal if he/she refuses to complete the Nutrition Screening Form ("Determine Your Nutritional Health Checklist")?

A: No, the participant will not be denied a meal. If a participant refuses to fill out the form it is their choice and we should respect their choice. Nutrition Programs, should however, should encourage participants to complete the Nutrition Screening Form because there may be services, including nutrition counseling

available if they do have a nutrition risk. In addition, AoA requires that persons at high nutritional risk be identified as part of federal reporting requirements.

6. **Q:** Does the privacy statement need to be included on all registration forms, nutrition intake forms, nutrition screening forms, and nutrition assessment forms?

A: Yes, the privacy statement is required on all registration forms, nutrition risk forms, and any other forms used to collect client-specific information that is placed in the SAMS database. The Area Agency on Aging will be verifying that all county forms have the appropriate privacy statement in place. This requirement takes effect November 1, 2008.

FAQ's Regarding Participant Information - 2

Q: Our county has already developed a privacy statement that we are required to use on all forms. What should I do?

A: If you are in this situation submit the forms to your area agency on aging for review to see if it meets the state standard.

Q: Are Benefit Specialists required to use the new standard privacy statement on the forms they use to collect participant information.

A: Yes. There needs to be informed consent to collect and store the data. That covers all programs including EBS. If they have such a form and it is reviewed and approved by the AAAs we will allow that, if they do not, they should use the one provided and approved by our legal counsel.

Q: We often gather participant information from people in an interview as compared to giving the person a form to complete. Are we required to recite the standard privacy statement to the person in this instance?

A: Yes.

Q: We often gather participant registration information from people over the telephone. Are we required to recite the standard privacy statement to the person over the telephone?

A: Yes. If you want to follow up with some sort of written privacy statement, that is at the discretion of the aging unit. This does not apply to conversations over the telephone, or via email, when you are not registering a client.

Q: We conduct a number of group events like picnics and health fairs. Are we required to recite/give the privacy statement to the hundreds of people who attend those events? We don't collect any personally identifying information on those people.

A: No. Aging units, and their providers, are only required to include the privacy statement on all registration forms, nutrition risk forms, and any other forms used to collect client-specific information that is placed in the SAMS database or other electronic database.
